RULES AND REGULATIONS

- **STOCK MAY BE INSPECTED AT THE SHOW**, in order to satisfy disease control measures.
- The Transport of Animals (Cleaning & Disinfectant (Scotland) Regulations 2005) applies to vehicles taking animals to and from the show. The only exemption is journeys to and from livestock shows not in a course of a single day (except before the journey to the show and after the journey from the show); given that journeys are direct, the transporter doesn't leave the show before the return journey and only animals transported to the show are allowed on it during the show and the return journey.
- It is the exhibitor's responsibility to ensure that all animals have adequate water.
- All livestock to be identified in accordance with the current legislation – SAGRIMO, CIR(S) and PRIMO.
- Animals moving to the show for the first time will not have to be kept separate prior to moving to the show irrespective of whether any other livestock have been moved onto the premises in the 13-day period immediately before moving.
- If attending only one show within any one 13-day period the animal will not require to be held separate on return from the show nor will the return home trigger a 13-day standstill for any other animal on the home farm. Also animals may move from show to show or may return to their usual premise of residence without triggering a 13 day standstill provided they are kept in separate facilities under an authorised separation agreement with SGRPID.
- All animals taking part in the show must return to their premises of origin.

CATTLE

- Bovine Viral Diarrhoea (BVD)
 - Any animal coming from a 'negative' Scottish breeding herd can move to a show.
 - Any animal from a 'not negative' herd cannot move to a show unless it has an individual BVD negative status.
 - No animal coming from a 'positive' herd can move to a show regardless of individual BVD status, as it will not be able to return home. (A 'positive' herd is one with known BVD positive animals).
 - It is advisable that any animal from a Scottish non-breeding herd should have an individual BVD negative status.
 - If any concerns, please seek your vet's advice on BVD prevention, e.g., vaccinating animals prior to show season, avoiding exposure of pregnant females to BVD infection.
- Cattle Identification Regulations (Scotland) 2007
 - Cattle moving to and from shows must be individually identified in accordance with current Scottish Government Regulations and have their movements notified to Scot EID within 3 days. Herd records and passports must be completed to show the movement took place.
- Tagging Requirements
 - Cattle born after 1st January 1998 must have a DEFRA approved ear tag in each ear (double tagging). The tag in each ear must have the same unique number, such animals will be identified throughout their lifetime by this unique number.
 - Animals born or imported into Great Britain before 1st January 1998 may continue to be identified by a single tag.
 - Cattle born after 1st July 2000 must be identified by all numeric tags.
- Keepers must bring the following documents to the show for each animal:
 - A cheque book style passport (CPPB); or
 - A single page passport (CPP52); or
 - A certificate of registration (CHRS); or
 - Green passport (CPPI)
- If the passport movement summary is full, a continuation sheet should be attached.

CLYDESDALES

- The Equine Animal (Identification) (Scotland) Regulations 2019
 - The regulations require all Equidae regardless of age or status to be accompanied by a passport.
 - From 28th March 2021, it has been a legal requirement that all Equidae, regardless of age or status must also be implanted with a microchip. This includes without exception, equines used for agricultural purposes, riding ponies, pets, companion animals, hacks, competition animals etc.
 - Foals that are un-weaned and accompanying their dam or foster mare may move to a show without a passport.
 - Passports can be held by the horse owner or keeper but should remain with the horse at all times; in particular, passports must accompany the horse when it is moved.
 - In Scotland, it is possible that a horse may move without a passport to show/competitions but will be accompanied by a 'ScotEquine' card. The ScotEquine card contains a minimum amount of visible information which includes the UELN and microchip number and also includes a photograph of the horse. A QR code on the card can be read using standard smartphone applications and acts as a portal into the ScotEquine database.

SHEEP

- Sheep and Goats (Records, Identification and Movements) (Scotland) Order 2009
- Tagging requirements
 - Sheep moving to a show must be officially identified.
 - Sheep born or identified after 31st December 2009 require full EID, two identifiers one of which must be electronic. The EID can be contained in a tag, a bolus or a pastern tag.
 - Sheep identified for slaughter under 12 months of age, require a single electronic slaughter tag which contains the flock mark only.
 - Breeding animals must be fully EID identified, for example with an EID tag and a conventional tag.
 - Sheep born after 18th January 2008 and before 31st December 2009 must be identified with two means of identification (two official ear tags or one official ear tag and a tattoo) bearing the same individual number.
 - Older animals born prior to 18th January 2008 and not already officially identified are now also subject to the double identification requirement. However in the case of animals born prior to 9th July 2005, this will only apply when the animals are to be moved off the holding.
- Movement Paperwork
 - The move on/off the show must be recorded in the holding register and if an animal is fully EID identified then its individual identification number must also be recorded. Animals identified with an EID batch slaughter tag are recorded on a batch basis.
 - A separate movement document to record each farm-to-show and each return show-to-farm journey should be completed before the movement commences. The document should specify the number of animals moved at batch level, the flock mark and the animals individual identification
 - The white copy of the document must travel with the animals and be sent to the Scottish Animal Movement Unit (SAMU) within 3 days of the completed movement taking place. The document should state the CPH of the show. The notification of this movement to SAMU is solely the responsibility of the keeper.

 - Maedi Visna forms MUST be brought to the show and given to the sheep steward.
